Known as Lot 490, the resort's proposed site is a vacant stretch of coastal land between Kingscliff and the Salt township that has long been sought after as blue-chip development land.

munity facilities", but the project is no certainty to receive approval.

Lot 490 is home to more than a dozen endangered species of birds and mammals.

Kingscliff residents' spokesman Jerry Cornford said the sighting of the curlew had given protesters new hope in their fight against the project.

"This is a very important wildlife corridor and it is home to many species of animals, some of them endangered," he said. "This project should not be going ahead.

"There's still a lot of question marks over it."

Leighton Properties managing director Mark Gray would not comment on the impact the bird's discovery could have.

Instead, he released a statement saying the group would await the findings of the Planning Assessment Commission.

"We have undertaken extensive analysis and studies, including detailed community consultation, which has been provided to the Planning Assessment Commission and they are conducting their process," he said.
